



Susan Au Doyle Will Lead AUW

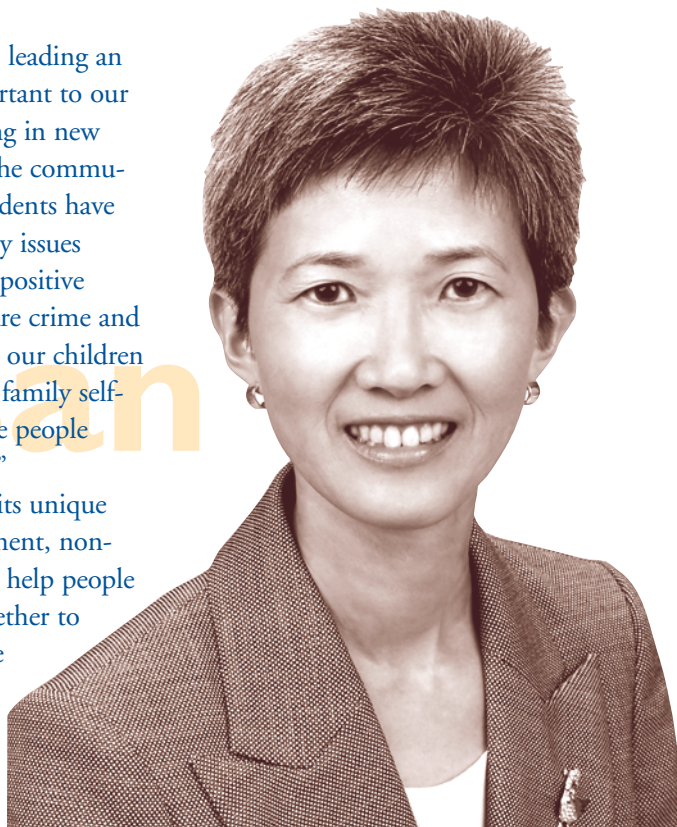
On August 27, the Aloha United Way board of directors unanimously appointed Susan Au Doyle to the position of president and chief professional officer. Doyle's promotion takes effect on December 1, the day after current president Irving Lauber retires.

"Susan has tremendous knowledge about the community," said Robert Hiam, HMSA President and chairman of AUW's board. "In her work at AUW, she's demonstrated extraordinary leadership and the ability to bring diverse groups together on important issues."

Doyle said AUW, with its unique reach into business, government, non-profit and other sectors, can help people and organizations come together to create long-term, sustainable change in these areas.

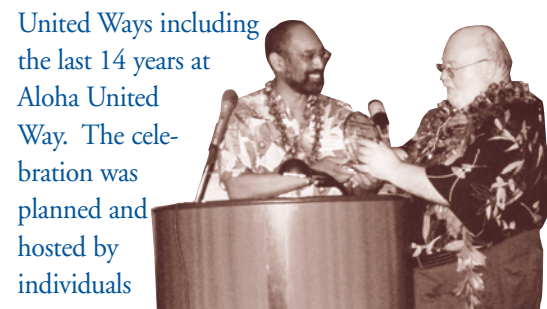
